Major grant success - NHMRC Partnership Grant for feMMe Molecular



In February 2022, the Australian Government announced QCGC Research as one of five recipients of the NHMRC Partnership grant. QCGC Research's feMMe Molecular trial focuses on a non-surgical treatment alternative for women with endometrial cancer. The NHMRC funding will support a postdoctoral research fellow and associated project costs. This success was only possible with our project partners' support. ENDO-3 addressing a 30-year knowledge gap

Our team started ENDO-3 – a randomised clinical trial – in 2021. The world-first study investigates the benefits and risks of sentinel node biopsy as part of the treatment of women with endometrial cancer. It addresses a knowledge gap that has existed for over 30 years. The outcomes will be critical to informing clinicians and patients about sentinel lymph node dissection's effectiveness, benefits and risks. Ultimately, it will determine the value of keeping or discontinuing this procedure in early-stage endometrial cancer treatment.

So far, eleven surgeons (nine from Australia & two international) have been accredited, with more in the pipeline. Patient recruitment is gaining momentum with 94 women, all from Queensland, now enrolled in the ENDO-3 Trial.

Team update

We also welcome our newest member of the team, Maria Vatca, Clinical Trial Coordinator, responsible for recruiting participants and data collection on the ENDO-3 trial at Queensland sites.
